Programme Overview

This studio-centred course offers you the opportunity to explore the disciplines of painting, sculpture, performance, installation, printmaking, lens based and digital media and the points at which they intersect.

The course introduces you to the fundamentals of the discipline of Fine Art, the debates that surround the subject and the relevant strategies and behaviours that form the basis for an inquisitive, experimental and reflective art practice. Through workshops, seminars, lectures and structured dialogue in the studios you will be exposed to a range of subject specific practical, theoretical and professional processes, methods and ideas. With a balance between taught sessions and self-directed enquiry, the curriculum reflects the bespoke nature of learning within the discipline of Fine Art encouraging you to identify and develop your own practice through material and conceptual investigation. Our Fine Art course is characterised by a profound synergy between academic and technical teaching and learning. In this community students and staff work together to understand and develop what contemporary art can or should be today.

Teaching in Fine Art takes the form of one-to-one tutorials in the studio, seminars, artist's talks, lectures, critiques, academic and technical workshops and study visits. With an approach that champions the embedded nature of theory within practice, the course will support you to develop an authoritative knowledge of the historical and contextual grounding to your practice. Central to the course is a comprehensive professional practice programme that will equip you with the confidence and skills to prepare you for work as a practicing artist, or within the creative sector. Through your active participation in external projects, exhibitions, presentations and initiatives, you will learn to be analytical, reflective and communicate your ideas verbally and visually. The structure of the course promotes curiosity, risk and innovation. Through your continued engagement you will progressively learn how to learn in this unique discipline, to develop your own position as an artist, and become an expert in your own field.

Programme Aims

1. To engage students in developing their own ambitious, inquisitive and reflective art practice as part of a learning community.
2. To provide strategies for students to develop their own theoretical, contextual and material research within the disciplines of Fine Art.
3. To stimulate an analytical, critical and ethical approach to learning through Fine Art practice
4. To develop the students' skills to observe, communicate, and visualise an understanding and evaluation of the discipline of Fine Art.
5. To equip students with the knowledge, confidence and skills to work collaboratively or independently as practicing artists and/or within the creative sector.

Assessment methods

A range of summative assessment tasks will be used to test the Intended Learning Outcomes in each module. These are indicated in the attached assessment map, which shows which tasks are used in which modules.

Students will be supported in their development towards summative assessment by appropriate formative exercises.

Please note: if you choose an optional module from outside this programme, you may be required to undertake a summative assessment task that does not appear in the assessment grid here in order to pass that module.

Work experience and placement opportunities

The course will provide you with a range of opportunities to participate in external projects, such as events, exhibitions, open studios, placements and publications. These opportunities contribute to the future development of your practice and facilitate your skills development in preparation for a broad range of employment possibilities within the creative industries.

In addition to the course external projects, you will have the opportunity to consider undertaking the Professional Placement Year (module YP5100). This is coordinated and supported by the Careers and Enterprise team, and you will be also be assigned a Professional Placement Year tutor.

In advance of starting a Professional Placement Year, the module preparation provides you with the opportunity to create a Development Plan, to identify, apply for, and secure the professional experience, normally comprising of 1-3 placements.

During the Professional Placement Year, you would commit to working for the external organisation/s for a period of 9-13 months, between the second and third year of your course.

At the start of your final year, you return to university and submit a Placement Report detailing your development on placement. By successfully completing the module, you are entitled to the addition of “with Professional Placement Year” to your degree title, evidencing your work and outcomes in respect of your placement, and demonstrating your ability to secure and sustain graduate-level employment.
