Programme Overview

MRes creates a space for composers to undertake a significant extended project, supported by academic research. It concentrates on using practice-led research methods to create a portfolio of compositions that articulate a clear research focus. Through weekly seminars, tutorials and workshops, it presents composers with current models and develops their awareness of the contexts in which their work might exist. This is reinforced by visits from leading composers, as well as workshops with visiting professional musicians.

In the Professional Practice module, you will develop your understanding of professional contexts, producing funding applications, promotional materials, and pitching a project to a visiting festival director. This is supported by visits from industry professionals active in publishing, royalties and performing rights, project development, and education and outreach.

You will receive performance of your work by visiting professional musicians, allowing you to hear your work played to a very high standard and to learn how to interact with players in rehearsal situations, as well as presenting your work effectively. Research Methodologies and Context introduces a range of research skills, including practice-led research methods. You will develop an extended research paper and annotated bibliography on a topic of your choice. This is supported by attendance at seminars organised by University research groups and centres.

These settings underpin the main focus of the MRes, the Research Project. This comprises an extended portfolio of compositions and a contextual commentary.

As with all of the Music and Performance Masters, this programme places you within a creative and vibrant artistic community dedicated to all aspects of music and the performing arts. Your programme therefore sits within a dynamic environment where we actively encourage you to work with other practitioners and scholars from other disciplines. You will also work with professional practitioners from a similar range of backgrounds who will bring differing perspectives to your work.

As well as teaching you how to compose, the programme also prepares you for a range of career opportunities in the arts. Including, but not limited to community music, workshop leading, teaching, commercial work and doctoral study.

Programme Aims

Throughout the course, the curriculum aims to:

1. Foster an understanding of current compositional contexts
2. Extend individual creative practice in relation to critical, analytical, historical and interdisciplinary contexts.
3. Engender a critical facility, both written and oral, in evaluating personal work and that of others.
4. Develop an understanding of suitable research methodologies to support to both artistic practice and academic research.
5. Foster professional skills to support the development and dissemination of practice.
6. Provide an environment in which to conduct an enquiry leading to the creation and interpretation of new knowledge through original research and practice
7. Enable the production of a portfolio of new compositions with associated documentation, supported by a critical commentary

Work experience and placement opportunities

You produce work aimed at professional performance contexts throughout the MRes. While it is not an assessment criterion, there is an expectation that you will

seek external opportunities to have your work programmed, either in self-generated events or organised series and festivals. Developing the necessary skills to succeed in disseminating work in these professional contexts is supported by PM7020 Professional Practice. This module equips you with professional skills, such as formulating projects, pitching, making funding applications, running events, making websites, promotion and marketing, and understanding rights, royalties, and publishing. The module includes visits from arts professionals, such as festival directors, journalists, promoters, publishers, and rights experts.

You will also work with visiting professional musicians who rehearse and perform their compositions. This develops professional skills in relation to preparing scores and parts, rehearsal technique and professional conduct.
